PROGRAM NOTES

Fanfare (2006) was written in 1912, as a prelude for the premier performance of the ballet *La Peri*. A prelude was needed to give the typically noisy audiences of the day extra time to settle into their seats. This was the last of his works Dukas allowed to be published. He was a greatly respected teacher and composer, studied at the Paris Conservatory and was a close friend of fellow student Claude Debussy. But he was highly critical of his own music to the point of destroying most of his works.

Flag and Seal (2024) is the winning composition of our contest to commemorate the new Minnesota state flag and seal which were adopted May 11, 2024. Glen's composition is an uplifting piece that includes a spirited melody, energetic accompaniment, and rich harmonies. Dr. Newton began arranging music in 4th grade and writing original works in 6th grade. His music has been performed by concert bands, symphony orchestras, mandolin orchestras, vocal ensembles, jazz bands, and brass ensembles in the U. S. and abroad.

I Love a Sousa March (1971) And don't we all! Over his long career, Sousa wrote 130 marches. (The Minnesota State Band has played only about 25 of them; we have a long way to go.) Which one(s) are your favorite? Is it *El Capitan*? Or perhaps *Semper Fidelis*, named for the U. S. Marine Corps motto "always faithful"? Our singer mentions those two. Maybe you prefer another: *The Stars and Stripes Forever, The Washington Post*, or *The Liberty Bell*, to name but a few.

The Hustle (1975) became a No. 1 disco hit on the *Billboard* Hot 100 during the summer of 1975. While in New York City to make an album, McCoy composed the song after watching patrons at a nightclub do a dance called "the Hustle". McCoy was a musical prodigy. By the age of 12, he had begun writing his own songs, and performing in local amateur shows with his older brother. He has approximately 700 song copyrights and produced songs by such recording artists as Gladys Knight & the Pips, Aretha Franklin, Peaches & Herb, and Lesley Gore.

The Shadow of Your Smile (1965), also known as Love Theme from The Sandpiper, was introduced in the 1965 film with a trumpet solo by Jack Sheldon and later became a hit for Tony Bennett. It won the Grammy Award for Song of the Year and the Academy Award for Best Original Song. In 2004, the song finished at number 77 in AFI's 100 Years/100 Songs poll of the top tunes in American cinema.

Rio Con Brio (1995) takes us on a colorful, spirited journey to Brazil. This music invites you to get up and dance to its energetic rhythms. The term "con brio" is an often-used musical expression that tells the musicians to play "with spirit". Besides being shorthand for Rio de Janeiro, "rio" can mean "I laugh". This music will certainly put a smile on your face.

Music from A BUG'S LIFE (1998) "Ladies, Gentlemen and larva of all stages", we present a medley of music written by Randy Newman for the Disney/Pixar film. The arrangement transitions from orchestral transcription to 1940s jazz and includes the original song *The Time of Your Life*. Newman's score is fun and jaunty. The film is about a tiny world and the music reflects both the smallness of the world and the overwhelming size of the hero's adventure.

Mars & Venus March (2023) is the third movement of John Philip Sousa's *Looking Upward Suite*. The idea for the march came while Sousa was gazing at the heavens on a clear evening. Sousa's suites were prominently featured in his band concerts, but they do not enjoy great popularity today. One reason for this is because Sousa could interpret his own music far more effectively than any other conductor. This new arrangement by Minnesota State Band member Brian Black was written in celebration of the Band's 125th anniversary.

Hoagy Carmichael in Concert (1978) Hoagy Carmichael was a fascinating man: a composer, pianist, singer, actor, bandleader, lawyer and artist. This medley features five of his greatest hits. *In the Cool, Cool, Cool of the Evening,* with lyrics by Johnny Mercer, won Carmichael his first Academy Award for Best Original Song. *Stardust,* an idiosyncratic melody in medium tempo, a song about a song, has become an American standard, recorded by hundreds of artists. *The Nearness of You, Heart and Soul* and *Lazy River* compete the set.

Over the Rainbow (1938) was the last song written for *The Wizard of Oz.* Inspiration came to Arlen suddenly while his wife drove them to a restaurant for dinner. The result was "a melody with a long, broad line, a ballad for a little girl who was in trouble and wanted to get away." But the song almost didn't make it into the movie. MGM executives removed it; they felt it slowed down the film. Producer Arthur Freed demanded the song stay, and it was put back in. *Over the Rainbow* was voted the greatest song of the 20th century in a survey by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Recording Industry Association of America.

The Genius of Ray Charles (2004) is an appropriate title for this medley of Ray Charles's unforgettable hits; he used the word "genius" in five of his album titles. He was often referred to by contemporaries as "The Genius", but among friends and fellow musicians, he preferred being called "Brother Ray". His unique style and passion for music is forever etched in our country's cultural fabric. Here is a masterful blend of some of Charles' greatest tunes: Georgia On My Mind; I Can't Stop Loving You; What'd I Say; Hallelujah; I Love Her So and Let the Good Times Roll.
